FIELD OF DREAMS UPDATE

I7th August 2016 was a historic day for deafblind people all across Scotland when the first spade of earth was cut for the new Learning and Development Centre on the "Field of Dreams" site in Lenzie. On a sunny day a small group of Directors, staff and funders was joined by local councillors, as well as Rona Mackay MSP and John Nicolson MP in a photograph to record the



moment. The ground is now officially a building site so all had to wear hard hats.

Deafblind Scotland's chairperson Bob Nolan introduced Michael Anderson, deafblind director, who had the honour of cutting the first sod, with a ceremonial spade. The building should be complete in May 2017.

We continue to raise the money still needed and have an Afternoon Tea on 11th September, and a Dinner Dance in the Millennium Hotel Glasgow on 29th October, tickets cost £40. For those who prefer a challenge we also have places on the Forth Rail Bridge Abseil on 9th October.

DEAFBLIND NATIONAL ADVISORY GROUP

The BSL National Plan will be published next October 2017. The National Advisory Group (NAG) has now met 3 times. The NAG's main responsibility is to draw up the BSL National Plan. There are 2 deafblind members of the NAG, Debra Wherrett and Leona Glennie.

In July and August the Scottish Government consulted with many deaf people, including deafblind BSL users. These groups have now given their views to the NAG. Their views are on a BSL video with subtitles here http://tinyurl.com/zb89tjd We have also sent deafblind BSL users a DVD copy.

The NAG have now begun the job of working on the priorities for the plan. They next meet on 1st November 2016.

There will be further consultation on the contents of the BSL National Plan. We will keep you informed of developments and hope you will feel able to make your own comments.

WELFARE RIGHTS

GOOD NEWS! Welfare Rights Project will be continuing.

Over the last 2 years Connect to Welfare Rights has successfully applied for varied benefits for both deafblind and visually impaired people including PIP, ESA and Attendance Allowance and has seen financial gains of around £520,000 for the people we have helped. During this time of welfare reform and financial hardship we have assisted about 120 sensory impaired people to claim benefits that they were previously unaware they were entitled to.

In June this year the project was given a Spirit of the Community Award by Yorkshire & Clydesdale Bank along with a cheque for £5000 towards continued funding.



The major change in benefits at the moment, for our membership, is the transition from DLA to PIP for under 65 age group. This is slowly taking place and you should receive your letter over the next few months. It is very important you ask for help to complete the form.

TRAIN STATION ACCESSIBILITY

Do you have any problems at your local train station or a station you frequently use? Perhaps the yellow lines are worn out, or there's no hand rail on the stairs. Maybe you can't read the signs, or the platform is uneven. Any issues like these, Stephen Joyce, our training manager, would be happy to receive and pass onto Abellio/ScotRail. RNIB REACT

Have you heard of the RNIB React fob service that can help anyone with sensory impairment? It is recognised throughout the UK including many areas in Scotland. The fob assists anyone with sensory impairment to



gain better access when moving around in busy areas and whilst using public transport. Any owner of a React fob will be able to access on the spot audible announcements for the next bus arrival at a bus stop and on other modes of public transport. It is small enough to go inside a pocket or can be attached to a lanyard. They will soon be launching a new piece of hardware called React interactive that works through Bluetooth via an app in Smartphones. CHARLES BONNET SYNDROME

Information from the RNIB. Charles Bonnet syndrome is named after a Swiss philosopher and writer who lived about 250 years ago. Charles Bonnet wrote about his grandfather's experiences after his grandfather lost his sight to cataracts and began having "visions". He could see patterns, people, birds and buildings, which were not really there. Charles Bonnet syndrome is a common condition among people who have lost their sight. It causes people who have lost a lot of vision to see things that aren't really there, known as visual hallucinations.

It can be distressing, but many people find that the hallucinations can get less frequent with time.

EU REFERENDUM RESULT

Why is Britain leaving the European Union?

A referendum vote was held on Thursday 23 June, to decide whether the UK should leave or remain in the European Union. Leave won by 52% to 48%. More than 30 million people voted. England and Wales voted for leave, but Scotland and Northern Ireland both backed staying in the EU.

What happens now?

Theresa May is now prime minister and she will start to discuss with the EU how the UK will leave. However, it may take 2 or 3 years before the UK actually leaves the EU.

This monthly class is completely FREE and is held in their studio at 139 Templehill, Troon. Wednesdays, 1-2pm.





DETECTING SIGHT AND HEARING LOSS

Questionnaires are going out to help folk find out whether there have been any recent changes in their eyesight or hearing.

North East Sensory Services (NESS) is working on behalf of the Aberdeen See Hear Strategy group to launch questionnaires to support front line health and social care staff to detect if there has been a recent sensory loss. If the questionnaires detect a change, then onward referral to an optician, and to a GP for a referral to audiology, should be made.
